artist, researcher, activist,
and performer. After
graduating with a Bachelor
of Music from Vanderbilt

University in May 2014, DeLesslin travelled to Copenhagen as a Humanity-in-Action Fellow, followed by a return to his reservation to conduct workshops with Catawba youth and oral history interviews with Catawba elders. Since relocating to the District of Columbia he has continued performing, working across media, and lecturing throughout the east coast including Nashville, Washington, Baltimore, New York City, Ithaca, and Charleston. In addition to Sparkplug 2.0 his time is spent teaching Digital Literacy at DC's premiere Adult Literacy non-profit (Washington Literacy Center) and giving an indigenous tour of the National Portrait Gallery's Presidential Portrait Gallery (indigenous discovery.com) which runs until Election Day 2016.



HANNAH JOO hails from Los Angeles, where she began studying ballet under the syllabi of the Royal Academy of Dance and American Academy of Ballet. Hannah moved to the Greater Philadelphia Area to attend Swarthmore College, where she recently graduated with a BA in Dance and Anthropology.

Swarthmore's dance program afforded her the opportunity to study with different balletic, modern, African, Indian, and other cultural dance traditions and to work with local and international choreographers. Outside the studio, Hannah is involved with Dance for All Movement Therapy and Dance for Parkinson's Disease.



PATRICK GALLAGHER LANDES has been working as a stage manager and playwright in Washington DC for two years. 
